A Note from Pastor Emily

We are two weeks into Lent, and once again faithful followers of Christ are preparing their hearts and minds for the both the cross and the empty tomb of Easter morning. Of course, this year has felt like one long Lent. This time last year, states were preparing to shut down to hopefully slow the spread of this virus, and churches were developing contingency plans for worship. Since then, we have existed in a strange new normal, one where masks, distancing, and hand sanitizer have become part of our daily routines. My mind can't quite get around the fact that we're a year into this pandemic, and yet, here we are, a second Lent spent in a mask.

In many ways, I am thankful that our denomination makes use of a liturgical calendar. It has been a way to ground ourselves in our faith, marking time as the faithful have done for centuries, reminding us that this, too, will pass. I have always liked the cycle of the liturgical calendar. It gives shape to our time together and reminds us, at various points, to slow down and spend some time reflecting on what this next season of life will bring.

In normal years, we would be spending this time in prayer, meditation, and scripture study. We would be undertaking Lenten disciplines and spiritual practices. But this year is different. I have found myself spending more time seeking patience and grace. My time spent in in God's word has seemed less about study, and more about seeking both guidance and comfort. To be honest, I didn't even "give something up" or "take on something new" this year as I would have normally done. Instead, this Lent has been about making do and getting through, as my grandmother used to say.

But our calendar reminds us that the cycle continues; Easter will eventually come, and new life will burst out of the tomb.

We are beginning to see reminders of this in the early flowering trees and bushes. Just yesterday, I happened across a beautiful patch of daffodils on my daily walk. We have lived in this home for nearly seven years, and this is the first time I have ever seen them bloom. It was a welcome reminder that new life is everywhere, sometimes hidden up until the moment that it pops up in full bloom.

Have a blessed Lent,


