#### Worship Returns to the Sanctuary October 4th!

A task force of members and staff have been meeting since May to try to plan our return to our beautiful new sanctuary. With numbers trending down, Council has approved a proposal to return to worship in the sanctuary on October 4th.

How will it work? Please read carefully to ensure a smooth transition.

- Worship will be at 9am and 11am
- Seating will be by reservation only -- we will send out a signup the Wednesday morning before worship. Call the office if you can't access it.
- Ushers will seat your group when you arrive. You may not be able to sit in "your" seat. Please be flexible!
- Masks will be required. We will have extras.
- Please plan to arrive early to allow time for everyone to be seated.
- Bathrooms will be available.
- Entry will be through the front doors only -- please don't come through the Fellowship Hall, even if you have a key.
- Sharing of the Peace will continue through sign language only.
- We will continue using individually-wrapped communion kits, picked up at the entrance along with the bulletin.
- Offering boxes in the Narthex will collect offerings.
- Music will be different -- we will use a spoken liturgy with no congregational singing -- hymns will be anthems or solos.
- CDC cleaning protocols will be followed.

We know this is a difficult time. If you would like to continue worshipping from home, please feel free. Worship will still be livestreamed on Facebook. Definitely don't come if you're feeling sick or have a temperature.

Finally, we still plan to have a church dedication and reception honoring Pastor Jane's ministries with us at a safer time.

#### Highlights of the ILC Council Meeting September 21, 2020

Incarnation will welcome our new seminarian, Lorie Gladyness. Lorie will be focused on Faith Formation and Worship during her year with Incarnation.

Renovation Task force: Pews are getting installed & only two items left on the punch list.

Covid 19 Taskforce: Council approved guidelines and there are plans to worship in person in the sanctuary starting October 4th. We will also continue to broadcast worship on Facebook.

Parking Lot: A committee is working on future parking plans with the city.

100th Anniversary Committee will meet again on September 27th after worship.

Council approved to submit an amended Constitution to the Congregation for approval at the November 22nd Congregational meeting.

The Nominations committee are looking for candidates to serve on council. If you are interested please contact Porter Kinard, Mimi Fisher, Mark Hall, Larry Marchant or Shawn DeJames.

Policies committee is working on updating the Policies Manual.

Financial team is working on a budget to submit to the Congregation before the Congregation meeting.

Giving is down 21% from plan.

Stewardship is working on a narrative budget to submit to the Congregation.

Next council meeting October 19th.

#### A Note from Pastor Emily

Fall is in the air. Foliage is starting to change color, football season is underway, and temperatures are finally dropping, although I'm sure we still have a few warm days left in store for us. But, even with the expected changes that this season brings, things are still not quite normal. Football games are taking place in mostly empty stadiums, schools are online or working on adjusted schedules, and masks are ubiquitous. But, as with everything else, humanity has begun to adjust to life during a pandemic and find ways forward. Holiday themed masks are right around the corner, I am sure.

The church, too, is finding our way forward during this strange time. Outdoor worship has been a blessing, as we've gathered together in socially distanced fellowship. And our live-streaming experiment on Facebook has been a tremendous addition to our worship life. We have managed to stay in community with one another, even while we have been forced to keep our distance.

As we continue to learn more about this virus and its transmission profile, we have continued to adjust our plans to re-open to in-person worship in our sanctuary. We are all anxious to be in our new space, but we also want to keep our members safe and healthy. While we hope and plan to worship indoors on October 4th, we will be following the guidance of the CDC, as well as some guidelines developed by our church leadership, in assessing the numbers of cases and the positivity rates in our communities. We are specifically monitoring the case load in Richland, Lexington, and Sumter counties as one of our determining factors.

If we are able to resume indoor worship on the 4th, worship, like everything else right now, will look a little bit different. To begin, we ask that you all enter through the double doors on Devine St. so that we can control the flow of traffic. When you enter the church, we ask that you do so as a family unit so that you can be seated together. If one of your party shows up later, they may be seated somewhere else, due to the nature of our seating arrangements. Once you've all arrived, ushers will seat you, and we will fill the church from the front to the back. Yes, this does mean that you may have to sit closer to the front than Lutherans typically do, and you may not find yourself in your normal pew. Ushers will also dismiss the congregation by row when church is over, again to regulate the flow of traffic and to minimize our exposure to one another.

Masks will be required when we are gathered inside. If you don't have one, one will be provided. We also ask that you practice good mask etiquette; make sure that it covers both your nose and your mouth and that it fits to your face without gapping. We will be offering two worship services, one at 9am and one at 11am, and we ask that you sign up for services either through the online sign-up that we will email out on Wednesday, September 29th, or by calling into the office. In between services, we will be disinfecting the sanctuary.

Bulletins, communion kits, and an offering box will be placed in the narthex for you to gather worship materials and place your offering, in order to eliminate the need to pass these items through the congregation. We will worship with the windows open, both to enjoy the cooler weather, and to increase the airflow in the church. We will not be singing our liturgy or our hymns, but we will have beautiful music, utilizing our new organ, our fantastic bell choir, and other appropriate instruments.

We are sure that there will be a learning curve, as we adjust to this new way of worshipping, but we are also confident in the grace and patience of this congregation as we do so. See you all soon.

<sup>22</sup>By contrast, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, <sup>23</sup>gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things.

Galatians 5:22-23

The Bible verse above is about fruit. No, we aren't talking about apples and oranges. It is about a different kind of fruit -- the fruit of the Spirit. We are talking about the way we act when we put our faith in Jesus. The Bible tells us that when we do that, the Holy Spirit fills us with God's love and produces some good fruit in our life.

If you see an apple tree, what do you expect to find on that tree? Apples! Well, when you see someone who is filled with the Holy Spirit, you expect to see what the Bible calls the fruit of the Spirit. What is that? It is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Oh my, that is some good fruit, isn't it?

Are we always patient? Are we always gentle and kind? No, there will be times when we fall short. When we fall short, we ask God to forgive us and fill us with God's Spirit so that we will produce the kind of fruit that God wants to see in our lives.

#### **Pineapple Cups**

**Step One:** Ask a grown up for help, and cut a green piece of paper horizontally (hotdog style). The piece that you cut should be about 2 inches tall and 11 inches long.

**Step Two:** Make smaller cuts on the long side of the strip of paper. Make sure you don't cut all the way across. Once you have cut all the way down, roll the paper together.

**Step Three:** Flip a paper cup upside down (make sure it is empty). Color the outside like a pineapple or use your imagination! Tape or glue the green paper to the bottom of the paper cup.
