

GATHERING

At the heart of the Good Friday liturgy is the passion according to John, which proclaims Jesus as a triumphant king who reigns from the cross. The ancient title for this day-the triumph of the cross-reminds us that the church gathers not to mourn this day but to celebrate Christ's life-giving passion and to find strength and hope in the tree of life. In the ancient bidding prayer, we offer petitions for all the world for whom Christ died. The music heard in this service was composed by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750). Our guest flutist is Cynthia Hopkins and our soprano soloist is Emma Schwertfuehrer.

LITURGY

We remember this day the crucifixion of our Lord.

Our Lord Jesus, who for our sake was obedient unto death.

We focus on the cross He carried in our place.

And the weight of sins which He bore for us.

Tonight we contemplate Jesus' suffering and death;

that we might die to ourselves through Him and be raised to new Life.

PRAYER OF THE DAY

The Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Almighty God, we ask you to look with mercy on your family, for whom our Lord Jesus Christ was willing to be betrayed and to be given over to the hands of sinners and to suffer death on the cross; who now lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen.

MEDITATION

THE SEVEN LAST WORDS

THE FIRST WORD: "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

SCRIPTURE READING: Luke 23:20-34

²⁰Pilate, wanting to release Jesus, addressed them again; ²¹but they kept shouting, "Crucify, crucify him!" ²²A third time he said to them, "Why, what evil has he done? I have found in him no ground for the sentence of death; I will therefore have him flogged and then release him." ²³But they kept urgently demanding with loud shouts that he should be crucified; and their voices prevailed. ²⁴So Pilate gave his verdict that their demand should be granted. ²⁵He released the man they asked for,

the one who had been put in prison for insurrection and murder, and he handed Jesus over as they wished.

²⁶As they led him away, they seized a man, Simon of Cyrene, who was coming from the country, and they laid the cross on him, and made him carry it behind Jesus. ²⁷A great number of the people followed him, and among them were women who were beating their breasts and wailing for him. ²⁸But Jesus turned to them and said, "Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, but weep for yourselves and for your children. ²⁹For the days are surely coming when they will say, 'Blessed are the barren, and the wombs that never bore, and the breasts that never nursed.' ³⁰Then they will begin to say to the mountains, 'Fall on us'; and to the hills, 'Cover us.' ³¹For if they do this when the wood is green, what will happen when it is dry?"

³²Two others also, who were criminals, were led away to be put to death with him. ³³When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. [[³⁴Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing."]] And they cast lots to divide his clothing.

Adagio, from Sonata in C Major for flute and continuo (BWV 1033)

THE SECOND WORD: "Truly I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

SCRIPTURE READING: Luke 23:35-43

³⁵And the people stood by, watching; but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" ³⁶The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine, ³⁷and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" ³⁸There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews." ³⁹One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" ⁴⁰But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? ⁴¹And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." ⁴²Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." ⁴³He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

Kyrie, Gott Vater in Ewigkeit (BWV 669)

THE THIRD WORD: "Woman behold your son...behold your mother."

SCRIPTURE READING: John 19:23-27

²³When the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they took his clothes and divided them into four parts, one for each soldier. They also took his tunic; now the tunic was seamless, woven in one piece from the top. ²⁴So they said to one another, "Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it to see who will get it." This was to fulfill what the scripture says, "They divided my clothes among themselves, and for my clothing they cast lots." ²⁵And that is what the soldiers did. Meanwhile, standing near the cross of Jesus were his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. ²⁶When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved

standing beside her, he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son." ²⁷Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother." And from that hour the disciple took her into his own home.

Kyrie, Gott Vater in Ewigkeit (BWV 672)

THE FOURTH WORD: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

SCRIPTURE READING: Matthew 27:45-49

⁴⁵From noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. ⁴⁶And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani?" that is, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" ⁴⁷When some of the bystanders heard it, they said, "This man is calling for Elijah." ⁴⁸At once one of them ran and got a sponge, filled it with sour wine, put it on a stick, and gave it to him to drink. ⁴⁹But the others said, "Wait, let us see whether Elijah will come to save him."

HYMN: "O Sacred Head, Now Wounded" ELW 351

THE FIFTH WORD: "I thirst."

SCRIPTURE READING: John 19:28-29

²⁸After this, when Jesus knew that all was now finished, he said (in order to fulfill the scripture), "I am thirsty." ²⁹A jar full of sour wine was standing there. So they put a sponge full of the wine on a branch of hyssop and held it to his mouth.

Sarabande, from Sontata in A minor for flute (BWV 1013)

THE SIXTH WORD: "It is finished."

SCRIPTURE READING: John 19:30

³⁰When Jesus had received the wine, he said, "It is finished." Then he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.

Da Jesus an dem Krueze stund (BWV 621)

THE SEVENTH WORD: "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit."

SCRIPTURE READING: Luke 23:44-49

⁴⁴It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, ⁴⁵while the sun's light failed; and the curtain of the temple was torn in two. ⁴⁶Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." Having said this, he breathed his last. ⁴⁷When the centurion saw what had taken place, he praised God and

said, "Certainly this man was innocent." ⁴⁸And when all the crowds who had gathered there for this spectacle saw what had taken place, they returned home, beating their breasts. ⁴⁹But all his acquaintances, including the women who had followed him from Galilee, stood at a distance, watching these things.

Facts from the 100th Anniversary Committee

In 1931, the church sponsored a show called "Madame Queen versus Andrew Brown" at the city's newly completed Township Auditorium (the city also had embarked on a building program at an unfortunate economic time) that netted enough profit to fully repay the debt owed the well-known local architectural firm of Lafaye and Lafaye and partially repaid the builder. Mortgage foreclosure was averted by the Savings and Loan's generous offer to trade Incarnation's adjacent vacant lot (bounded by Devine at the front and Kirkwood to the side) for a reduction in the new sanctuary's mortgaged amount with the option to repurchase later, freeing the congregation to eventually refinance the remaining mortgage debt on the new building at better terms. Interestingly, the Ladies' Auxiliary was the organization within the church that made the mortgage payments to repurchase the lot.
